THE HANGMAN'S MOOSE

Double bowline. A non-slipping eye. A comfortable sling to sit in.

Shorebank, knotted. For shortening a rope without cutting it. More secure than ordinary shorebank.

Lark's head with toggle. Used as a boat fastener. Released by removing the toggle.

Parson's lead. For joining large beams.

Firmish knot. For joining two ropes.

Fisherman's eye knot. Firmish loop. A hard loop. Used on small size rods, etc.

Rowline. A non-slipping eye. Will not jam. Easily untied. 1.5¢ every 50 per cent.

Shocking and brack. For fastening a rope at right angle to a post. For hoisting lumber, etc.

Single bow-knot. For joining cords. Readily untied by pulling on end of longest cord.
